

Thank you for taking the time to read this, the 21st edition of Friends of St. Vincent's.

For more than eleven years we have reported on the hundreds of donors and fundraisers who have made such a difference to the care environment in our hospitals.

Fundraising Highlights

In the following pages we detail many of the events that contribute to support for equipment and activities in our hospitals and to enable the many research projects that, over time, improve our capacity to care for patients and enhance their outcomes. Mostly, sources of support can be summarised as follows:

- **Personal Donations.** Usually done on a confidential basis where the donor wishes to make a difference but not be publicly identified. We always respect this and, if in doubt, do not name benefactors.
- **Fundraisers.** Ranging from personal participation in large events to uniquely organised functions, these are a major contributor to our funds. The creativity involved is amazing.
- ♦ Contributions from Pharmaceutical Companies. In support of specific research projects or healthcare initiatives, these companys' grants are very important in pursuing our aims of improving the medical environment for our patients.
- **Bequests.** Increasingly in recent years we have seen that people are setting down what they want to happen after their death and often including a gift to a preferred charity. In our case this frequently is for a specific cause in the hospital. St. Vincent's Foundation has been an active partner in MyLegacy.ie in encouraging people to make Wills and to consider a small donation to a charity of their choice. The central feature of this is "Best Will Week" which happens each Autumn.
- ♦ **Donations in lieu of funeral flowers.** These continue to be a most generous source of support. The generosity is all the more remarkable given the sadness affecting the bereaved families at the time.
- Wedding favours. On a much happier note, we are always delighted when couples decide to include a gift to St. Vincent's, as part of their wedding plans, instead of Wedding Favours on their great day.
- ◆ Tax Refunds. In some circumstances personal donations can allow us to make a claim from the Revenue for a tax rebate which increases the value of the donation at no further cost to the donor. We encourage donors to sign the necessary certificate where appropriate.
- Collection Boxes. Each year these boxes throughout the hospital raise nearly €10,000 which is a very welcome addition. We must thank those people who, completely anonymously, support our collection boxes so generously throughout the hospital.
- Standing Orders. We take the opportunity to thank the people who, over time, have created Standing Orders for regular payments to St. Vincent's Foundation. Many of these have been running for several years and we really appreciate each and every one.

A big, big thank you to all involved and we hope you will enjoy and be inspired by the stories that follow.





2019 Sligo Warriors Run:

Since 2013, the Sligo Warriors Run Committee have donated to St. Vincent's at the request of Denis Foley, whose land is part of the course.

The Warriors Run is a multi-terrain 15km race, which takes 800 competitors from the beachfront in Strandhill to the top of Knocknarea, around Queen Maeve's cairn and back to the beachfront. €2,000 was donated to St. Vincent's from the this year's event, making a total of €9,000 to date. 
St. Vincent's Rugby Club's Charity Ball for Colorectal Disease care:

Wedding Favours Donation:



This year's Halloween Raffle raised €3,775.75 and now brings to almost €47,000 Christine's contribution to this vital medical area.



Donors making a difference

In the pages that follow we demonstrate the practical impact that donors and fundraisers have had on patient care in St. Vincent's Hospital.

Here we feature investments in patient and family comforts, and equipment financed by donors through St. Vincent's Foundation

Software Purchase from Endocrine funding:

St. Vincent's Foundation was delighted to approve funding, from Endocrine funds, to purchase a new software package for the Hospital DXA machine.

Dr Rachel Crowley describes below the detail of this software and the positive impact on patients who will be exposed to it. "The software package for the hospital DXA machine is called Trabecular Bone Score (TBS). This score is calculated at the same time as the patient has their DXA scan. It adds to their density and their fracture risk score, to provide further information about their risk. We expect that it will add to management of bone health for patients on Breast Cancer treatment; post-Transplant and with Obesity.

St. Vincent's is the first centre in the country to get this software, so it is a really exciting development for the Bone Unit. It is particularly appropriate as St. Vincent's is the Irish Orphanet Centre for rare bone disease"

On behalf of our patients we thank those donors who made this possible and to Dr Crowley who championed this development.

Refurbishment in St Luke's:

St. Vincent's Foundation was delighted to fund the refurbishment of the Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) Room in St. Luke's 2 Ward. This room serving for MDT meetings also doubles as a Family Room for the ward (see photos below). The impact on patients and their families is very positive. We are grateful to the donors and fundraisers who made this possible.





Donors making a difference continued.....

Pre Hospital Blood and Fluid Warmer equipment purchase:

St. Vincent's Foundation recently approved a grant for a system to enable blood transfusions be delivered at trauma scenes. Up to this, the patient could only receive blood when they arrived at the hospital. This initiative will save lives and we are delighted that the investment has been enabled by donors. The article below by the lead Consultant of the project, Dr David Menzies, explains how patients will benefit:

Blood transfusions can now be delivered at trauma scenes - for the first time in Ireland

- Major haemorrhage is one of the top causes of death from major trauma
- New blood transfusion service expected to reduce mortality rates

Patients in the Dublin/Wicklow region suffering from life threatening bleeding following major trauma no longer have to wait until their arrival at the Emergency Department (ED) before receiving a blood transfusion. The blood transfusion laboratory at St. Vincent's University Hospital (SVUH), in partnership with Wicklow Rapid Response (WWRR), a declared asset to the National Ambulance Service (NAS), is now able to provide emergency blood and plasma directly at the scene of a trauma.



This is the first time in Ireland that blood will be available for pre-hospital transfusion and will provide a significant improvement in the care that can be delivered to patients immediately after a major trauma. Wicklow Rapid Response is a pre-hospital critical care service driven voluntarily by Dr. David Menzies, Emergency Medicine Consultant from St. Vincent's University Hospital in partnership with the National Ambulance Service. It is one of a handful of services in Ireland where doctors are tasked by the NAS to serious medical and trauma emergencies where the patient may benefit from critical care treatment at the roadside.

To date the only method for pre-hospital medics to resuscitate bleeding patients has been to use saline solution but, because it doesn't carry oxygen or clot, it is not the ideal treatment. Now, in the event of life-threatening bleeding, the WWRR critical care doctor will be able to deliver life-saving blood transfusions to patients without having to wait until their arrival at the Emergency Department.

Dr. David Menzies, St. Vincent's University Hospital said: "There are a group of patients who are so severely injured that we will have blood waiting for them on arrival in the Emergency Department for immediate transfusion. Pre hospital blood transfusion will reduce significantly the time it takes to deliver this treatment. Our current case load indicates that a small but important number of patients may benefit from this every year. The facility to administer life-saving transfusions in the pre hospital setting is already the standard of care for pre hospital critical care services in the UK, Northern Europe, Australasia and the USA. It's fantastic that we can now offer it here in Ireland for the first time."

•Mr Martin Dunne, Director of the National Ambulance Service said: "The patient is at the heart of our work and the NAS values greatly the contribution of the voluntary pre hospital critical care services make

to patient care. The NAS is delighted to support the enhanced patient care that pre hospital transfusion can offer and looks forward to expanding this project".

Dr Joan Fitzgerald, Consultant Haematologist at St. Vincent's University Hospital said: "This exciting new development has been several months in preparation and will make a real difference to the treatment we can deliver to seriously injured patients in the region. The Medical Scientists in the Blood Transfusion Laboratory have worked closely with the Emergency Department, the National Ambulance Service and Wicklow Rapid Response to ensure the system is safe and secure with no wastage of blood products and full traceability 24/7 including holiday periods".

In addition to red cells, WWRR will be carrying two units of plasma to promote blood clotting. While the red cells carry oxygen, transfusing plasma in a 1:1 ratio with red cells is the current best evidence for promoting blood clotting, a recognised problem in major trauma patients. The emergency blood and plasma are supplied every 48 hours from the blood transfusion laboratory at SVUH and replenished as required. If unused, the products are returned within 48 hours to the blood transfusion laboratory at SVUH for use elsewhere, preventing any wastage. Blood products are a precious resource and must be stored refrigerated. The blood products are stored in Credo © "Golden Hour" boxes, which are validated for prolonged storage on the WWRR RRV at 4°C thereby making the blood and plasma immediately available at the location of a major trauma.

When the blood is required, it must be warmed to body temperature which is a key step in preventing hypothermia and other complications in patients receiving blood products.

Thanks to fundraising and donations, St. Vincent's Foundation were recently able to purchase a portable blood and fluid warmer for pre hospital use. The Qinflow © Warrior blood and fluid warmer (pictured) is a state of the art device, specifically designed for out of hospital use. This will be the first such unit in use in Ireland and it has the capability to warm intravenous fluids and blood products from 4°C to body temperature in seconds.

We are really grateful to the donors and fundraisers who have made this possible





Dr. Stephen Field, Medical & Scientific Director of the Irish Blood Transfusion Service said: "The IBTS are delighted to support this initiative, which will be life-saving. There is good scientific evidence for pre hospital transfusion and it is the norm elsewhere. Blood products are always in demand, if people would like to support this, one of the best ways they can do so is to donate blood themselves".

Gloria Winterlich, Dolls House Restorer

In this edition we are featuring two creative individuals who have given a lot to St. Vincent's.



Gloria Winterlich:

Gloria combines great artistry and kind generosity to renovate dolls' houses in aid of charity. Many of her models were from original handcrafted houses dating from earlier generations and now discarded and nearly destroyed. In all cases the renovated houses are works of art.

What started about twenty-five years ago as a hobby has matured into a year-round activity. Gloria's home has so many craft works in progress. She shared with us the variety of places where she has sourced the wrecked houses. Some were acquired from house clearance sales and many more from auctions where Gloria's husband, Tony, would watch out for houses suitable for her work. As Gloria's reputation as a restorer grew, she was contacted by people who knew of suitable items available. If Gloria

had not taken them "under her wing" there is little doubt that some of these would have been permanently discarded in contrast to the heirlooms they have now become.

Looking at photos of the "before and after" of restored houses, it really is amazing to see what she has



achieved. One can imagine the number of chidren (and not-so-young) who will get endless pleasure from her work for many years to come. The pictures here show the house that will feature in the Christmas Raffle and the same property in its original condition.

My Legacy & Tax Reclaim for Charities



Best Will Month

My Legacy is an umbrella group of 60 Irish charities, of which St. Vincent's Foundation is one. Our group vision is to create social change; to increase the low level of will making in Ireland at every life stage and to make legacy gifts the norm in Ireland and a widely recognised and respected way of supporting a charity into the future. A

charitable legacy gift is tax free.

In Autumn each year My Legacy organises events to encourage everyone to make a will. An important message in this communication highlights the wisdom of making a will to ensure that your wishes, in relation to your assets, are fulfilled after your death. It is a simple process and entirely confidential between the individual and the solicitor making the will. The percentage of people in Ireland who make a will is low by international standards and the absence of a will often leads to an expensive and sometimes divisive process to deal with the intestate estate.

The other objective of My Legacy is to encourage people to consider a small bequest to a favourite charity when the needs of loved ones have been catered for. A legacy gift can have a positive impact long after the person's life. In this area Ireland falls behind the UK and USA. 6% of donations in Ireland come from wills compared to 9% in the UK and 12% in the USA. My Legacy is looking to change this for the better.

We all know that small acts are the start of great change. As a member of @MyLegacy.ie we know that any legacy gift, no matter how big or small, will have an impact on us and the work that we do.

In St. Vincent's, many important investments have happened as a result of a bequest. These include support for Cancer Research programmes and for patient care. We are very grateful to the wonderful people who made this possible. In 2018 alone St. Vincent's received over €140,000 in legacy bequests.

Tax Reclaim for Charities

As a registered charity, donations to St. Vincent's Foundation can be enhanced when we can reclaim tax on the amount donated. From January 2013, for all donations of €250 or more in a given tax year the receiving charity receives a tax rebate for the charity provided the donor/taxpayer had paid tax of this amount or more in the relevant tax period. Because donations are made from "after-tax" income the tax reclaim is calculated to refund the amount of tax that would have been deducted and the taxation rate used is 31%.

The benefit to charities is best demonstrated by the following example - where a donor gives €500 during 2018 to St Vincent's Foundation the €500 is considered to be what was left after the donor had paid tax. At a rate of 31% this gross amount before deduction of tax is calculated at €724.65. If the donor has paid a minimum of €224.65 in tax in 2018 the Revenue will repay this amount (€224.65) to St. Vincent's Foundation thereby increasing the value of the donation by almost 45%. Relevant donors complete and sign a Revenue CHY4 form, which we will provide and the tax reclaimed is very worthwhile as it substantially increases the income to charities at no further cost to donors.

How we handle your money

Regular readers will be familiar with this page which we reproduce in each edition as we feel it is important to demonstrate both our activities but also our consistent policy in dealing with donations.

Donations: In line with our privacy policy we generally do not highlight specific donors unless they specifically request to be identified. Most donors want confidentiality and we always respect that.

Personal details of **Donors** will remain confidential unless SVF is specifically requested by the Donor to publicise them. Otherwise Donors will be able to recognise their own donation by reference on that page to the donation date and amount and by the cause, if they have specified one.

Fundraisers will be individually identified in the publicly accessible database, if they have requested to be identified, by name and amount raised. Otherwise they will be able to recognise their contribution by reference to the presentation date and amount and specific cause if nominated.
