I am delighted to have the opportunity to contribute to this edition of Friends of St Vincentø.

As Group Chief Executive of St Vincentøs Healthcare Group, I am constantly aware of the challenge of delivering the world class healthcare that our patients deserve. A major challenge is related to the physical environment of the hospitals and the quality of our premises. I am really proud of our staff in St Vincentøs University Hospital. Every day they work tirelessly for our patients and provide exceptional care as has been done in this hospital for more than 176 years. If the hospital and its staff are to continue providing the excellent care that it has provided to-date, it is critical for us to ensure our medical staff have the most up-to-date and best equipment and facilities to care for our patients. To do this we need your support as well as that of the Government.

St. Vincentøs University Hospital is a forward looking, innovative, voluntary hospital. Through excellence in healthcare which is enhanced by medical education and research, it will continue to provide the highest quality of care to its patients in the most effective and efficient manner possible as well as continuing to be responsive to its patients, and their familieøs needs, beliefs and wishes.

The hospital is an independent voluntary hospital managed by a Board of Directors under the legal structure of a registered company, not for profit, which has charitable status. This means that the hospital and its Board are not managed by the HSE or the Department of Health & Children (DOH&C). The hospital has a contract with the HSE/DOH&C to provide hospital services to the public. Each year this contract is negotiated. It should be recognised that the hospital is not fully funded by the HSE, the infrastructure, land, properties and equipment are owned by the company and not the State (HSE). While, over the years, the hospital receives funding from the State, it can not depend on the State for all its funding.

Similar to other companies/businesses, the hospital has to try and generate other streams of revenue to support its activities without which it could not survive. That is why we need your support and are so grateful when you can help us. The only way we can ensure the dedication and professionalism of our staff is optimised is to provide them with the best environment and equipment they need.

St. Vincentø University Hospital is one of the largest University teaching hospitals in the country. The hospital provides a front line trauma/emergency service and national/regional medical care at inpatient and outpatient level with in excess of fifty medical and surgical specialties. The hospital has 554 in-patient beds, incorporating 7-day, 5-day and day care options, including intensive care, high dependency and coronary care beds as well as medical, surgical, orthopaedic, care of the elderly and psychiatry beds. The hospital is a health promoting hospital. Education (undergraduate and post-graduate) and research are major components of the hospitalø activities

St. Vincentø University Hospital is the largest of the three hospitals in St. Vincentøs Healthcare Group (including St. Michaeløs Hospital and St. Vincentøs Private Hospital) employing in excess of 2,500 staff. 80% of the staff are directly involved in providing care to our patients. Many of our staff are leaders in their respective fields in the country and are internationally recognised. The following are just some of the hospitaløs areas of specialty interests:

- Cancer (Breast, Colorectal, Colon, Prostate, Pancreatic, Lung etc)
- Cardiovascular / Heart Disease
- Stroke and Care for the Elderly
- Respiratory Disease (COPD, Cystic Fibrosis, Sleep Apnoea)
- Neurology (MS, Parkinsons)
- Endocrinology (Diabetes)
- Accident & Emergency (Trauma)
- Liver Transplantation and related Hepatobiliary work

We are heartened by the number of events that have been organised by supporters of St. Vincent's. These take a lot of work and generously benefit our patient care and research. The range of events chosen shows the courage and ingenuity of supporters as well as their kindness.

EstatesUpdate - August 2010

The Hospital continued with a number of development projects in the first six months of 2010 including ward upgrades, service redesigns, essential maintenance and reconfiguration of areas including St. James and St. Agnes Wards to improve our service to patients, visitors and staff.

2010 is proving to be a very difficult year for capital funding and the Estates Strategy Group continues to work within very tight budget constraints but have managed to continue its refurbishment and upgrade program especially in patient care environments. Support from generous donors will be increasingly important in this environment.

In addition to this, the hospitals Technical Services and other service departments, have been working behind the scenes to improve essential services. These include the recent installation of new boilers and water tanks, improvements to fire detection and installation of fire doors and the continuing upgrade of access control across the campus.

Significant recent activity includes:

New Ward Block

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Following the submission of tenders for the design, build and financing of the new ward block at St. Vincent's University Hospital which will incorporate the new Cystic Fibrosis unit, the hospital is currently finalising the details and contracts.

Background work and preparations on this project are currently very active and from late December 2009 onwards the hospital completed various decanting projects necessary to leave a clear site ready for the new ward block construction.

Alternative accommodation was developed for the departments inhabiting the site and entailed relocating many hospital departments/services.

St. James Ward

- The transformation of St. James Ward
- (Ophthalmology) from an inpatient area to a
- comprehensive day service, including the

investigation and management of age related Macular Degeneration (AMD) and Diabetic eye diseases has proven very successful and has improved patient safety and efficiency. This has streamlined the service from a patient perspective. They no longer need an overnight stay and has greatly improved throughput and reduced waiting lists.

The refurbishment work included reconfiguration of the bed base from 7 inpatient beds to day service, a new procedure room, upgrade to the waiting room and doctor's examination room and all floors, Doorways and electrics upgraded.

The department has now seen a significant rise in the number of patients attending the ward for various day procedures since the changes were introduced. Statistics indicate that during the first quarter of 2010 patient numbers have risen to 1223 in comparison to 820 in 2009 for the same period.

The Estates Strategy Group continues to work within very tight budget constraints but have managed to continue its refurbishment and upgrade program especially in patient care environments.

St. Anne's Ward

St. Anne's Ward reopened in April following a major refurbishment that created a better patient environment, reducing risk of infection and considerably improved hygiene standards. The work entailed a complete strip out of the ward and the replacement of all mechanical and electrical services including flooring, painting, lighting and decorating. The project saw the introduction of a new nurse office, utilities, drug preparation, storage and most of all new toilets and showers for patients.


Radiology Ultrasound Room

Two additional ultrasound rooms were developed to meet the demands created by the new Rapid Access Prostate Cancer Clinics. This created a better patient environment and improved waiting times. This work was completed as part of St. Vincent's commitment to improving services for patients and was partly funded by the National Cancer Control Programme.

St. Luke's Ward

A new Surgical Observation Unit was completed in July which included modifications to existing layout to create a designated 4 bedded unit for the care of Pancreatic Patients designed to improve the privacy and dignity for patients and their families. The work entailed an upgrade of flooring, ceilings, lighting and the installation of nurse call, T.V.'s and extensive monitoring to reduce risk and improve patient safety.





St. Agnes Ward

In July following some minor works and redecorating St. Agnes Ward was reopened as the new home for the IV Therapies Suite. The work involved included repainting, T.V. installation and upgrading of the office areas to accommodate the service. This has allowed the service to expand and is now fully equipped for 14 patients. This development provided patients with a much welcomed larger brighter facility and with easier accessibility. The move also meant an increase in day case beds on St. Marks' Ward to meet the growing demand to see patients on a day case basis, reducing length of stay and increasing throughput.

There are also a number of projects currently still in progress or near completion including the upgrade of the Dermatology Unit, a new Patient Library, Theatre and St. Catherine's Ward upgrade. A full update on all these projects will be given in the next newsletter.

Some Medical Highlights from St. Vincent's

SVUH Surgeons Obtain Significant Research Funding

Surgeons at St Vincent's University Hospital have secured more than one million euro in external research funding from Science Foundation Ireland and the Health Research Board. This remarkable achievement has been attained following external peer review and in the face of marked cutbacks in funding available for research and strong competition.



The largest grant, worth almost €650,000, was awarded by Science Foundation Ireland to a research consortium led by co-investigators Prof Ronan O'Connell and Prof Des Winter to study colonisation of the human colon by sulphate reducing bacteria in health and in Ulcerative Colitis. The consortium includes St Vincent's consultant staff Prof John Hyland, Prof Diarmuid O'Donoghue, Prof Hugh Mulcahy, Prof William Hall and Prof Kieran Sheahan. In addition collaboration has been established with TCD through Dr. Neil Docherty, UCC through Prof **Fergus Shanahan and** University of Limerick through newly appointed Prof Calvin Coffey. The project will use

sophisticated next generation

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genetic sequencing to profile the types of bacteria present in the colon of patients with ulcerative colitis and explore the relationship between sulphate reducing bacteria and disease activity. Preliminary work has shown that sulphate reducing bacteria can be detected in the mucous that normally protects the colonic mucosa and that there is a change in the ratio of these bacteria in acute colitis.

A research group led by Consultant Surgeon and UCD Senior Lecturer in Surgery Mr James Geraghty has been awarded €260,000 by the Health Research Board to study new prognostic markers of breast cancer using a model of cellular senescence and will be undertaken though a collaboration with Dr A Bracken at Trinity College Dublin.

A research group led by Prof Des Winter has been awarded €250,000 to conduct a randomised clinical trial of laparoscopic levage versus laparotomy and resection for perforated diverticular disease. This is a clinically very important development and arises from research conducted at St Vincent's, St Luke's Hospital Kilkenny and the Mercy Hospital Cork that has shown potential benefit for the less invasive laparoscopic technique.

Outstanding Achievements by SVUH Surgical Trainees

Specialist surgical registrar Mr Jurgen Mulsow was awarded the Association of Surgeon's of Great Britain and Ireland Gold Medal for achieving first place in the Intercollegiate Fellowship in Surgery examination held in May. Mr Mulsow had been working in the Surgical Professorial Unit and Department of Colon and Rectal Surgery. In July Mr Mulsow moved to Erlangen, Germany to take up a Fellowship in Colorectal Surgical Oncology in the University of Erlangen under the direction of Professor Werner Hohenberger.

A paper presented by Mr Calvin Coffey, based on work performed at St Vincent's and the UCD School of Medicine and Medical Science, was awarded the prize for best research presented to the annual meeting of the American Society of Colon and **Rectal Surgeons held in** Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA in May 2010. Mr Coffey was Specialist Registrar in the Surgical Professorial Unit and **Department of Colon and** Rectal Surgery in 2008-9. More recently, Mr. Coffey has been a Fellow at the Cleveland Clinic, Ohio, USA and in May 2010 was appointed to the Foundation Chair of Surgery at the University of Limerick.




Patients have long expressed their gratitude for this accommodation, often provided at a time of great vulnerability for the family.
