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Welcome from Kilian McGrane, Chief Operating Officer



I am delighted to introduce you to the Autumn edition of 'Friends of St. Vincent's'.

I was appointed C.O.O. of S.V.U.H. in May, having spent more than a decade working in the Health Service Executive, National Cancer Control Programme and prior to that in the Department of Health. In the 5 months that I have been here, I have been incredibly impressed that the philosophy of the Founding Sisters, of dignity, compassion, justice, quality and advocacy, permeates everything we do in the hospital.

From the many years I have spent working at a national policy level, I am acutely aware that funding decisions have a direct impact on our patients. While the funding ensures that we can provide an appropriate level of care, it limits the ability of our dedicated staff to enhance the experience of our patients through their journey here in St Vincent's hospital; and that is where the '*Friends of St.Vincent*'s' play a vital role.

The access to charitable funding, enables us to enhance the level of care we provide; whether that is something small, like improved seating in a waiting area, or buying a higher specification tilt table for the stroke patients; the support of the 'Friends of St. Vincent's' helps us to improve the patients experience.

In healthcare we are heading into exciting times; St Vincent's Healthcare Group is one of two Level 4 hospitals (the other is the Mater) that will for part of the new Ireland East Hospital Group. This group, incorporating 11 hospitals, will be the largest in the country, supporting over Imillion people. S.V.U.H. will play a central role in this new group.

In this new era in healthcare, funding will be allocated at a higher level and the role of '*The Friends*' will be even more important to maintain the quality of what we deliver. All of the staff in the hospital are very grateful to all the patients and families who donate their time, energy and money, to making the experience of our patients better.

Update from John Hickey, C.E.O. of St. Vincent's Foundation



As we move towards the end of 2013 we can look back on one of the best summers in recent years. We had great sunshine and many memorable events in sports and otherwise.

In St. Vincent's Foundation we also enjoyed the continued support of so many individuals, families and groups. Some were helping for the first time, some were existing Friends of St Vincent's that have contributed or fundraised for many years. We are grateful to them all.

As always the range of fundraising activities has been enormous and they make great stories reflected throughout this magazine. Some raise large

amounts of money, some smaller but every euro makes a real difference to our patients. It is worth repeating that St. Vincent's Foundation makes no deductions for costs and therefore every cent raised goes directly to the cause selected by the donor/fundraiser.

During the last month or so, we were enormously surprised when a family told us that they wanted to donate $\in 80,000$ per year to a specific cancer research project for a total of 4 years; $\in 320,000$ in all. Their condition was that they would be guaranteed complete privacy in their donation.

Another surprise since our last edition was a legacy gift of $\leq 260,000$, again for cancer research. This is very rare but highlights the importance of supporting a charity when making a will. The amount need not be very much to make a huge difference to people who need it.

Because of the generosity of donors and fundraisers we can invest in equipment, facilities and research that would not be possible otherwise. Some examples of these are:

- Improvements to premises and equipment in the Liver unit
- Additional equipment in the Cardiac unit
- Scopes and other important equipment for diagnostics and treatment in oncology
- Major research projects in cancer treatment
- Research into psycho-oncology and its impact on patients outcomes
- Improved patient comfort with individual televisions in wards
- A range of booklets for patient and staff education

These are just some of the ways that our patients and their families have been helped by the Friends of St. Vincent's

In this edition we are delighted to welcome Kilian McGrane who has joined St. Vincent's as Chief Operating Officer.

Before our next edition of *Friends of St. Vincent's*, Christmas and New Year will have come and gone. I want to wish all our supporters a very Happy Christmas and a healthy and successful 2014. 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Improvements to St. Vincent's

Premises improvements in St.Vincent's

Acute Medical Unit Expansion

The development of the Acute Medical Unit has continued over the last few months. This included the upgrade of patient rooms into a short stay medical assessment area within the current footprint. The ongoing reconfiguration and further expansion will give an overall bed complement of 36 long stay and 5 short stay beds once completed and this will greatly enhance the patient's experience and assist in the delivery of efficient quality care. The minor works are well underway to continue the expansion and future

plans include a purpose built clean utility, improved bed and sanitary facilities affording greater patient privacy and dignity, upgraded storage areas, enhanced patient support facilities and improved administration and staff work stations.

This unit will be an integral part of the Hospital's drive to improve patient care pathways and the Unit's primary function is the immediate and early specialist management of patients who present to the Emergency Department and are referred for acute medical assessment.



Day Surgery Unit / 2 new Day Theatres

Extensive refurbishment of two decommissioned theatres is underway into purpose-built Day Theatres and is expected to be completed and open by the end of the year. The new Day Surgery Unit will care for people undergoing a wide range of surgical procedures that do not require an overnight stay and the aim of the unit is to improve and enhance the patient's journey throughout their procedure.

The Day Surgery Unit will be a modern, purpose built department and will provide a calm and relaxed area for patients whilst waiting for their surgery. The dedicated admissions area and changing facilities will help ready patients for their procedures and provide a safe and relaxed environment. The new unit will work closely with the current Day Ward, St. Marks, in providing patient's with comfortable and a peaceful recovery space.

Day Surgery provides a means of helping the hospital to treat more patients faster and is therefore a key strand in shortening lengths of hospital stay. The additional two day theatres will allow patients receive treatment that is suited to their needs and allows them to recover in their own home. Expected benefits include a reduction in day surgery cancellation rates, reduced risk of hospital acquired infection, greater availability of inpatient beds for more major cases, improved throughput of patients, and reduction in waiting lists.

Research Donation:

We have commented in this magazine previously that some of our donors do not wish to be named. An outstanding example of this recently was a family who donated $\in 80,000$ to a specific cancer research programme. Amazingly the family also advised us that they will be providing the same amount annually for the next three years. This will bring to $\leq 320,000$ their total contribution to a vital research project. Their stipulation is that they must not be identified. This research will have a very positive impact on the lives and outcomes of current and future patients.



Tony Gartland – World Transplant Games:

Through the generosity of donors, St. Vincent's Foundation were delighted to support Tony Gartland from County Carlow in this year's World Transplant Games, which took place in Durban, South Africa July 28th – Aug 4th. Tony was the first person in Ireland to undergo a liver transplant in St. Vincent's 20 years ago. Coincidentally Tony was also the first Irish medal winner in this year's World Transplant Games, winning four medals in total. A number of liver transplant recipients who have joined the Irish team since Tony's involvement have cited his achievements as part of their inspiration to

get involved. The longevity of Tony's transplant and his continued success at European and World Transplant Games is a point of pride for the staff of the Liver Unit here in St. Vincent's. Ireland had 27 athletes

competing in the World Transplant Games, of which four had liver transplants. Tony recently called in with

his medals (see *photos*). Some excerpts below from Tony's report on his pioneering operation and his involvement capture the success perfectly:

"Twenty years ago, January 1993 to be exact, I underwent a liver transplant operation in St. Bridget's Ward. This was the first such medical procedure to be carried out in Ireland and it is testimony to the expertise and care of all the staff there as it was a 100% success and I have enjoyed a fantastic quality of life through all the years subsequently."

"Recently in July 2013, I travelled with the Irish team to Durban, South Africa.



Over 50 countries participated and it was an incredibly uplifting experience to compete with and against so many fellow organ recipients from around the globe. Quite frankly I found the whole week in Durban intoxicating."

"When we arrived back in Dublin we were given tremendous media exposure which all helps to bring the whole issue of organ donation to the forefront of public discourse."

YOUNG INVESTIGATORS RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM 2013

The D.A.M.C. Young Investigator Research Meeting, now in its 4th year, was held for the first time in the Education & Research Centre at St. Vincent's University Hospital on Wednesday, 22nd May 2013.

The number and the standard of abstracts submitted were as usual extremely high. The process of selection involved eight reviewers drawn from the three pillars of the D.A.M.C. campus - St. Vincent's University Hospital, Mater Misericordiae University Hospital and U.C.D., including all of its associated hospitals.

All abstracts were subjected to rigorous peer review by the independent reviewers. There were 53 abstracts submitted and all were reviewed by at least seven of the eight reviewers. For obvious reasons reviewers did not review abstracts submitted from their own teams, so this was no mean task. I wish to extend my thanks to the reviewers for their time and expert input without which the process and the meeting would not be possible. The mean scores were then ranked and the top 8 abstracts in each category -Translational and Clinical, were selected for oral presentation (I abstract was subsequently withdrawn). In addition, the top 28 abstracts were selected for presentation as posters. So, the D.A.M.C. Young Investigators Research Symposium maintains its highly competitive standard and this accurately reflects the high quality of the clinical and translational research that is being conducted through the D.A.M.C.

The meeting attracted a large audience of students (MD, PhD and BHLS), post-doctoral scientists and principal investigators who provided a lively forum for discussion of the presentations and posters. The chairpersons also acted as adjudicators and it was clearly not an easy task to choose the best presentations. In the end however, the adjudicators managed to come to unanimous decisions.

Congratulations to all the presenters for their work, and especially to the award winners:

• Dr. Elaine Walsh was awarded the best oral presentation in the Clinical Research Section for "Cancer in pregnancy: To treat or not?".

• Hayley Beaton was awarded the best oral presentation in the Translational Research Section for "Wnt6 is increased in diabetic nephropathy and modulates de novo tubulogenesis and opposes TGFb mediated epithelial cell differentiation in vitro".

• Karen Nolan was awarded the best Poster presentation entitled "Paricalicitol regulates TGF-b1 and HIF pathways in renal epithelia".

I wish to congratulate also all the co-authors and principal investigators for their contributions to the exceptionally high standard of research across the D.A.M.C. I am sure it will continue to yield excellent results nationally and internationally. As this meeting will now rotate between SVUH and MMUH alternate years, I look forward to next year's meeting at the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital. Finally, I wish to extend my thanks to Louise McCormack (SVUH) and Rita Marron (MMUH) without whose invaluable support and organisational skills this meeting would not have materialised.

History of St. Vincent's



Donations over the ages

From the very beginning the generosity of supporters enabled St. Vincent's to provide excellent healthcare to patients who could not afford to pay for care themselves. We do not propose to list them all but include some of the more outstanding contributions during the 180-year life of the hospital.

At the outset in 1834, the first building of the hospital in St. Stephen's Green was purchased from The Earl of Meath with a gift of £3,000 from the family of Sister Frances Teresa O'Farrell, a newly entered nun in the Order. Records in 1834 also show that the Marchioness of Wellesley donated £20 to help with fitting out the hospital. In the same year this was further supplemented by a Christmas collection which raised £36.18s.4d. These were vital supports at a time when money was scarce.

In those early years one of the more interesting fundraising activities came about somewhat by accident. A sailor who had been treated in St. Vincent's left a parrot to the Matron. It subsequently emerged that the parrot swore fluently and was considered unsuitable to be in a hospital. It was decided that he should be auctioned and $\pounds 60$ was raised from the auction.

In 1841 the family of a young nun donated funds to buy 57 St. Stephen's Green from the Earl of Westmeath which doubled the size of the hospital.

Records from 1864 show that a Mr Francis Coppinger of Mounttown Castle, provided funds to purchase a property from the Earl of Carysfort. This was to be used as a convalescent facility. The running costs of this building were funded by a bequest from Michael Bernard Mullins of Merrion Square.

In 1860 Dublin Corporation donated \pm 300 to St. Vincent's and three years later this was increased to \pm 400. At this time the annual salary of a Medical Consultant was \pm 50.

The historic records of the hospital through those years mention many sales of work, penny collections and personal donations.

Donor support continued in the modern era. At a cost of $\pounds 2,700,000$ the Education & Research Centre in St.Vincent's was developed and opened in 1989. For the following five years there was extensive fundraising which included sponsored horseracing events and Gala Balls. The support of the business community was canvassed and medical and other staff in the hospital were active in contributing to the successful creation of this great facility which serves well to this day.

Art sales and golf outings were annual fundraising events during the 1990's and early years of this century. All contributed in their time to the development of care in St. Vincent's.

The variety of recent fundraising events are well chronicled in this magazine and in earlier editions, as well as on our website. They demonstrate that the generous giving and fundraising of the Friends of St. Vincent's remains as vibrant as ever.

Legacy Gifts to St. Vincent's

Making a will is a very personal thing but very important to ensure that your assets are used, after your death, according to your wishes. Many people will amend their wills as their circumstances change over their lifetime.

People who make a will often speak of the peace of mind they get from recording their intentions properly. Very interestingly some research in the UK found that people who have made wills have lived longer on average than those who didn't. Other than being a curious point it isn't possible to say why this is so.

If you are making or changing your will please consider leaving a gift to St. Vincent's Hospital after you have taken care of family and friends. Any legacy small or large makes a real positive difference and helps others after you are gone.

From the time that St. Vincent's was established in 1834 we have been able to offer additional care to our patients through money left to the hospital in wills. Some people specify the particular area of medical care or research that they want their money to go to as it means something special to them. We will always carry out the wishes of the legacy donor.

Often we only hear about a gift to St. Vincent's being included in a will after our benefactor has died. We would love to know who our benefactors are, so that we could meet them and thank them for their support for the hospital.

Recent research on charitable giving, leaving gifts in wills to charities and will making in Ireland shows that:

- Ireland was ranked as the second most charitable country in the world in the 2011 World Giving Index
- The Index showed that 75% of the Irish population gives money to charity every month (while 38% volunteer time and 65% help strangers)
- However only 34% of adults in Ireland have made a will and of those who have a will, it is estimated that only 10-12% have included a gift to charity
- Having a will appears to be a function of age as 82% of those over 65 years have a will whereas only 51% of those aged 45 64 years of age and 26% of those aged 35 44 years have a will

Of those who don't yet have a will, 30% would like to leave a gift to a charity in their will and this desire is highest among 18 – 24 year old respondents

Revenue CHY4 Form

In Budget 2013 the Minister for Finance advised that there was to be a change in the way that charities like St. Vincent's Foundation could make a reclaim for taxation on donations in certain circumstances. This has now been clarified.

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From January 2013 donations of €250 or more in a given tax year would received a tax rebate for the charity provided the donor/taxpayer had paid tax of this amount or more in the relevant tax period.

Because donations are made from "after-tax" income the tax reclaim is calculated to refund the amount of tax that would have been deducted and the taxation rate used is 31%.

The benefit to charities is best demonstrated by an example as follows: where a donor gives €500 during 2013 to St Vincent's Foundation the €500 is considered to be what was left after the donor had paid tax. At a rate of 31% this gross amount before deduction of tax is calculated at €724.65. If the donor has paid a minimum of €224.65 in tax in 2013 the Revenue will repay this amount (€224.65) to St. Vincent's Foundation thereby increasing the value of the donation by almost 45%.

Relevant donors complete and sign a Revenue CHY4 form, which we will provide and the tax reclaimed is very worthwhile as it substantially increases the income to charities at no further cost to donors
