Welcome from John Hickey, C.E.O. (Voluntary) of St. Vincent's Foundation

We welcome all readers to this first edition of our donors' magazine since late 2019. Throughout the period of restrictions due to Covid-19, we didn't publish because the vast majority of distribution of this magazine is to patients and visitors to the hospital and these numbers were very limited. In addition, we were highly conscious of the risk of spreading infection and it was unclear, in the early stages of the pandemic, whether handling of papers and magazines were a continued risk. Thankfully we are now able to resume printed communication.



Throughout the two years we continued to record the huge support we received from fundraisers and donors. Some of these were new to us. Many of them are the people who, year-in year-out, have been so generous and committed to ensuring that St. Vincent's can invest in patient care, in research and in medical education. We are so grateful to them all and delighted to tell their stories here.

Covid-19 certainly brought out the best in our communities. Right across the country fundraisers conceived the most amazing ideas for raising money and raising morale. The organisation and hard work involved in these projects was just stunning.

Normally we report here on the highlights of the financial performance, in the previous year, of St. Vincent's Foundation. Because two years have passed I would like to summarise what was achieved in 2019 and give detailed information for 2020. In 2019 we received €568,000 between fundraising and donations and we had operating costs of just under €20,000. It enabled us to provide financial support of €346,000 to activities within the hospital.

The total received in 2020 was simply amazing both in terms of the numbers of gifts but also the total amount of €1,600,000 received in the year enabling us to finance investments to a value over €900,000 for the hospital. The summary details are summarised in the article that follows and, as usual, the full detail of our accounts can be viewed on our website

Before we invite you to read the heartwarming stories that follow of kindness and support, we would like to pay tribute to the phenomenal frontline staff in St. Vincent's and in every hospital, who gave their all for every one of us. We owe them a huge debt of gratitude.

We are really delighted that Kay Connolly, C.E.O. of St. Vincent's University Hospital has contributed an article this time and it makes for interesting reading.


We mention in each issue that, as a voluntary organisation, St. Vincent's Foundation assures donors and fundraisers, that every cent raised goes to the intended cause.

2020 Business and Financial Summary

By any standards, 2020 was an extraordinary year. The demands on everyone were immense and nowhere more than in our healthcare system. We saw how care-givers in all roles rose to that challenge. What was equally amazing was the response from the public in making donations and organising fundraising events to help the hospital to cope with the challenge of Covid-19. Both fundraising and donations were at an all-time high. With a total received of over €1.6M, it was three times what we would normally expect to receive. We can only express our sincere thanks to everyone who supported us and to assure them that their contribution saved lives. As usual we depict below where funds came from and how they were spent.



INCOME:


Not surprising, given the focus on fighting Covid-19 the majority of funds received were restricted to particular medical specialities mostly, but not exclusively to the response to the Covid virus. In excess of €717,000 was dedicated to the capacity to deal with Covid

-19, a further €600,000 was restricted to other medical areas and marginally less



than €100K was unrestricted

GRANTS:

Enabled by the funds contributed we were able to support projects in the hospital with more than €900k during the year in the areas of medical equipment, research, education and patient support. Some of the funds received will be deployed during 2021 and beyond. All will be to the benefit of our patients.

EXPENSES:

St. Vincent's Foundation continues to operate on a voluntary basis with no salaries or wages. Costs therefore amounted to just €10,835 (2020 €19,935). The reduction in costs of 47% is due to the timing of some bills between different years and also represents a reduction in activity due to Covid-19 restrictions. Principal expenses are fees for accounting, legal and insurance, website hosting and maintenance. Travel costs, telephone costs, commission payments to the online platforms for online donations, depreciation and financial charges made up the balance.

Production of our twice-yearly donor's magazine Friends of St. Vincent's was suspended for 2020 and this also reduced printing costs.

Fundraising Highlights



In the following pages we detail many of the events that contribute to support for equipment and activities in our hospitals and to enable the many research projects that, over time, improve our capacity to care for patients and enhance their outcomes. Mostly, sources of support can be summarised as follows:

- **Personal Donations.** Usually done on a confidential basis where the donor wishes to make a difference but not be publicly identified. We always respect this and, if in doubt, do not name benefactors.
- **Fundraisers.** Ranging from personal participation in large events to uniquely organised functions, these are a major contributor to our funds. The creativity involved is amazing.
- Contributions from Pharmaceutical Companies. In support of specific research projects or healthcare
 initiatives, these companys' grants are very important in pursuing our aims of improving the medical
 environment for our patients.
- **Bequests.** Increasingly in recent years we have seen that people are setting down what they want to happen after their death and often including a gift to a preferred charity. In our case this frequently is for a specific cause in the hospital. St. Vincent's Foundation has been an active partner in MyLegacy.ie in encouraging people to make Wills and to consider a small donation to a charity of their choice. The central feature of this is "Best Will Week" which happens each Autumn.
- **Donations in lieu of funeral flowers.** These continue to be a most generous source of support. The generosity is all the more remarkable given the sadness affecting the bereaved families at the time.
- Wedding favours. On a much happier note, we are always delighted when couples decide to include a gift to St. Vincent's, as part of their wedding plans, instead of Wedding Favours on their great day.
- ◆ Tax Refunds. In some circumstances personal donations can allow us to make a claim from the Revenue for a tax rebate which increases the value of the donation at no further cost to the donor. We encourage donors to sign the necessary certificate where appropriate.
- ◆ Collection Boxes. Each year these boxes throughout the hospital raise nearly €10,000 which is a very welcome addition. We must thank those people who, completely anonymously, support our collection boxes so generously throughout the hospital.
- Standing Orders. We take the opportunity to thank the people who, over time, have created Standing Orders for regular payments to St. Vincent's Foundation. Many of these have been running for several years and we really appreciate each and every one.

A big, big thank you to all involved and we hope you will enjoy and be inspired by the stories that follow.

On Easter Sunday 2020 David Duggan (pictured) undertook the dual ordeals of a 24 hour fast and a full marathon. He managed to do the latter keeping within the maximum 2km distance from his home.

Through this valiant effort, David raised the magnificent sum of €6,100 which was deployed to supporting frontline staff in the three hospitals in St. Vincent's Healthcare Group.

In David's message he expresses the objective perfectly: "We see the lights never go out and we wish to thank all staff and their families most sincerely for their heroic efforts at this difficult time. I ran my first ever Marathon in the local area on Easter Saturday having fasted for 24 hours beforehand. Through a GoFundMe page, I received approximately 200 donations from family, neighbours, friends from my former school St. Michael's College and some of my work colleagues in PWC. Together they contributed €6,100". Thank you David for supporting St. Vincent's.

Mark's Burke's fundraising for I.C.U.:

Mark Burke from County Wicklow, having experienced the full impact of Covid-19, was determined to use the opportunity to fundraise for frontline staff whom he describes as "frontline heroes".

I would like to point out that under these extraordinary circumstances that we have



'all found ourselves in, it is our belief and experience that the nurses of Ireland have wholeheartedly saved the country from a tsunami of deaths. We thank them. We appreciate them and we will never ever forget them."

In 2019 the event raised €4,390 and over ten years they have contributed almost €60,000, which is a vital support to our transplant programme and to patient care and research.


Run for a Life 5km

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Donors making a difference

In the pages that follow we demonstrate the practical impact that donors and fundraisers have had on patient care in St. Vincent's Hospital.

Here we feature investments in patient and family comforts, and equipment all financed by donors through St.Vincent's Foundation

Specialist Chairs for the Liver Unit;

Enabled by generous donations and fundraising we were able to purchase specialist chairs for St. Brigid's Ward. A Regency electric chair was purchased in early 2020. This chair will mean that higher dependency patients will be able to sit out; a significant contribution to their care and recovery. In September 2020, a specialist Perry chair was purchased to assist patients with mobility issues.

These chairs are a major contribution to patient care and comfort in our Liver Unit and we are most grateful to the donors involved.

Tiernan Family Support for Patients:

Dr. Eoin Tiernan heads Palliative Care in St Vincent's and this role led to a great contribution to the barriers facing patients and their families in the Covid-19 environment.

Having experienced the challenges faced by patients requiring isolation in St. Vincent's because of Covid 19, Dr. Tiernan shared the challenge with his family. The response was immediate. His wife, Sandra, and his children immediately sought support for supplying iPads and other communication devices, so that patients could communicate with their loved ones, often in the most difficult of circumstances.

The scale of the response was such that they were able to extend the support way beyond the hospital to residents in nursing homes and elsewhere. So far, they have received over 140 iPads. The need is very great and more support would be very welcome.

Televisions in Wards:

It may seem very ordinary but for patients, particularly those who have a longer stay in hospital, access to a working television is a major contribution to their comfort. Because of the help given to St Vincent's Foundation we have been able to install televisions in many wards at a total cost of c.€24,000 per ward. We will continue to support this and we thank those who enabled us to do so.

Equipment purchased for Cystic Fibrosis Patient care:

A grant from St Vincent's Foundation enabled the C.F. Unit in the hospital to purchase a Vest Airway Clearance System. Physiotherapist, Ronan Buckley explains below the patient benefits from this equipment.

"Cystic Fibrosis (CF) is a multi-organ disease, mainly effecting the lungs and digestive system. It is caused by a defective gene that results in the production of thick and sticky mucus. People with C.F. perform physiotherapy based airway clearance breathing exercises to clear this mucus from the lungs on a daily basis. In varying circumstances, people may not be able to actively participate in this

airway clearance in their usual way. In these scenarios, The Vest Airway Clearance System offers an alternative method. It is a garment, like a life jacket, which provides vibrations to the chest wall to dislodge mucus from the lungs. St. Vincent's Foundation has provided funding to the C.F. Physiotherapy Team at The National Referral Centre for Adult Cystic Fibrosis here in St. Vincent's University Hospital to purchase the Vest. The whole C.F. team feel this will assist them in their goal of providing the highest quality of care to those attending the centre."

Donor support for C.F.:

As the National Centre for Adult Cystic Fibrosis in Ireland, we continue to enhance our capability in this area because of the generosity of donors that we highlight so often in these pages. To improve efficiency and response to patients needs we invested in communications technology for the ward area.

For patient comfort, we purchased state-of-the-art Dyson Fans for St. Christopher's C.F. Ward. These are particularly important as patients with C.F. often have to isolate in their own rooms, even in warm weather.

As part of ongoing research into C.F., we supported the unit in the acquisition of monitoring equipment to determine the effect of exercise on symptoms and well-being. This work goes on.

Similarly we grant aided a joint UCD/St. Vincent's research study in Cystic Fibrosis under Prof. Ed McKone. Prof. McKone outlines "We are very grateful to St. Vincent's Foundation for supporting work we are doing in collaboration with C.F. Centres in Seattle and lowa, looking at the impact of new C.F. drugs and how they are improving quality of life and need for hospitalisation in our C.F. patients"

Obesity Research:

St. Vincent's Foundation, through Prof Donal O'Shea provided a grant for a joint research programme with Maynooth University which will benefit patients over time. The work is best described by Prof. Donal O'Shea as follows:

"Between 2020 & 2021, the Obesity Immunology Research Group (OIRG) at Maynooth University received two very generous donations from St. Vincent's Foundation to help support their research programme. These donations, totalling €115,000 were funded by a generous gift from an anonymous donor, and have helped the OIRG investigate the impact of obesity on SARS-CoV-2 vaccine efficacy.

With other viral pandemics, like HINI influenza, people with obesity (PWO) were more severely impacted, and had reduced protection after vaccination. We set about asking if the same was true for SARS-CoV-2, and early results indicate that PWO may have comparable vaccine responses, and although these results need to be confirmed, this represents positive news for those living with obesity".

Frailty Car initiative:

St. Vincent's Foundation is delighted to support the purchase, in partnership with St. Vincent's University Hospital, of a specialist vehicle for delivery of patient care for the EDITH (Emergency Department in the Home) service.

The initiative, to shift care from Emergency Department (ED) to a team travelling to patients' homes, follows a trial period from early 2020 and is now firmly established as an effective way of treating patients. The suitable cohort of patients include those suffering dehydration, falls, pain and orthostatic hypotension. The visiting team will typically be an ED doctor, Occupational Health staff and an Advanced Paramedic.

Karen Donohoe, Business & Operations Manager, SVUH summarises the effectiveness of the project: "...The Team see, review and treat an average of 10 patients/day and to date approx. 91% of this group have been able to have their complete episode of care provided in their home. Of the 9% who required conveyance to Hospital some of these required attendance for diagnostics only and were able to go home immediately afterwards and did not require overnight admission. To date, almost 3,000 patients have benefited from this service, which has been a resounding success and a positive innovation for the patients, the staff and the hospital as a whole of which we are very proud..."

Since then this initiative has been recognised nationally for an Ireland East Healthcare Innovation Award and a HSE Excellence Award. Congratulations to all the team involved. This project wouldn't have been possible without donor support.

Scalp Cooling:

Owing to the success of the original installation there has been an increased demand from patients for access to the system while undergoing Chemotherapy. St Vincent's Foundation funded the equipment at the start and is pleased to finance the expansion as well as cover the costs of elements that have to be replaced over time.

Investment in Intensive Care:

• The Intensive Care Unit in St. Vincent's capacity has been boosted by the appointment of additional staff for the area. This investment is optimised by sponsoring staff members to undertake the Post-Graduate qualification in Intensive Care. The cost for each participant is c. \in 8,000 and St. Vincent's Foundation is proud to have financed much of the cost. The impact for future patients will be highly beneficial.

Additional iPad support for ICU:

Based on the success of an earlier investment on adapting iPads for patient use in the Intensive Care Unit, we were able to add to the access there. I.C.U. presents particular challenges for patient's use of technology and the specialist engineering staff there were able to custom-design the units to great effect. We were delighted to provide the finance for this.

Urology Support:

We financed the purchase of an Ultrasound Probe. This is of primary benefit in treating patients with kidney cancer. It enhances the capacity of the Robotic Surgery system which St. Vincent's Foundation enabled some years ago and which has been most successful.



Endoscopy Discharge Lounge:

We were delighted to finance the refurbishment of the Endoscopy Discharge Lounge in the hospital. This has made a huge difference to the comfort and dignity of patients in this medical area. Previously the environment was unsuitable for what was required.

Stroke Unit equipment purchase:

Through the generosity of a kind bequest to St. Vincent's Stroke Unit, we were able to purchase a Cortrak machine for the Unit. The benefits of the Cortrak machine are summarised by Imelda Noone, Clinical Nurse Specialist in the Stroke Unit: "Each year approx 120 stroke patients are admitted to St. Vincent's with a swallowing problem and require an NG tube for essential feeding. The Cortrak machine is a real time computerised system that ensures that the tube is correctly placed at all times avoiding the need for XRay. It allows earlier commencement of feeding. The impacts on safety and patient care are immense"

Covid-specific support:

We have mentioned earlier that the response to the hospital need for help in battling Covid-19 was phenomenal. Apart from the enabled purchases we have outlined above, we have also financed to a total cost of $\le 643,000$ the following:

- Full ventilator system including carts and Restrainers
- Line Stacks and pumps
- Patient monitors
- Nine Philips Monitors
- ♦ A Magna Pure ICU system

We spent a further €100,000 on:

- Additional specialist training for nurses in the Intensive Care Unit
- Covid-19 related research projects

These were enabled by the many, many donations and fundraising events featured elsewhere in this magazine. We were particularly fortunate to receive two very large donations where the donors asked for anonymity.

Staff Wellness Booklet:

• The challenges of Covid-19 demonstrated starkly that frontline staff are themselves vulnerable to adverse impacts on their own health. As part of an overall staff protection and wellness programme, St. Vincent's • Foundation were pleased to repeat the financing of supporting materials for this.

Focus on Christmas

Our last Christmas Cards and Christmas Raffle campaign in 2019 was in support of <u>Pancreatic Cancer Care</u> in St. Vincent's. Thank you to all our staff, patients and supporters who contributed to a very successful raffle. The total proceeds of our Christmas Card & Raffle sales in 2019 came to €7,262.45. In 2020, again driven by Covid-19 restrictions we didn't organise a raffle or card sales but we did have many people who requested that we supply cards by post and we thank them for their support. My Legacy & Tax Reclaim for Charities



Best Will Month

My Legacy is an umbrella group of 60 Irish charities, of which St. Vincent's Foundation is one. Our group vision is to create social change; to increase the low level of will making in Ireland at every life stage and to make legacy gifts the norm in Ireland and a widely recognised and respected way of supporting a charity into the future. A charitable legacy gift is tax free.

In Autumn each year My Legacy organises events to encourage everyone to make a will. An important message in this communication highlights the wisdom of making a will to ensure that your wishes, in relation to your assets, are fulfilled after your death. It is a simple process and entirely confidential between the individual and the solicitor making the will. The percentage of people in Ireland who make a will is low by international standards and the absence of a will often leads to an expensive and sometimes divisive process to deal with the intestate estate.

The other objective of My Legacy is to encourage people to consider a small bequest to a favourite charity when the needs of loved ones have been catered for. A legacy gift can have a positive impact long after the person's life. In this area Ireland falls behind the UK and USA. 6% of donations in Ireland come from wills compared to 9% in the UK and 12% in the USA. My Legacy is looking to change this for the better.

We all know that small acts are the start of great change. As a member of @MyLegacy.ie we know that any legacy gift, no matter how big or small, will have an impact on us and the work that we do.

Tax Reclaim for Charities

As a registered charity, donations to St. Vincent's Foundation can be enhanced when we can reclaim tax on the amount donated. From January 2013, for all donations of €250 or more in a given tax year the receiving charity receives a tax rebate for the charity provided the donor/taxpayer had paid tax of this amount or more in the relevant tax period. Because donations are made from "after-tax" income the tax reclaim is calculated to refund the amount of tax that would have been deducted and the taxation rate used is 31%.

The benefit to charities is best demonstrated by the following example - where a donor gives €500 to St. Vincent's Foundation the €500 is considered to be what was left after the donor had paid tax. At a rate of 31% this gross amount before deduction of tax is calculated at €724.65. If the donor has paid a minimum of €224.65 in tax in the years of donation, Revenue will repay this amount (€224.65) to St. Vincent's Foundation thereby increasing the value of the donation by almost 45%.

Relevant donors complete and sign a Revenue CHY4 or CHY3 form, which we can provide, and the tax reclaimed is very worthwhile as it substantially increases the income to charities at no further cost to donors.

How we handle your money & Fundraising

Regular readers will be familiar with this page which we reproduce in each edition as we feel it is important to demonstrate both our activities but also our consistent policy in dealing with donations.

Donations: In line with our privacy policy we generally do not highlight specific donors unless they specifically request to be identified. Most donors want confidentiality and we always respect that.

Personal details of **Donors** will remain confidential unless SVF is specifically requested by the Donor to publicise them. Otherwise Donors will be able to recognise their own donation by reference on that page to the donation date and amount and by the cause, if they have specified one.

Fundraisers will be individually identified in the publicly accessible database, if they have requested to be identified, by name and amount raised. Otherwise they will be able to recognise their contribution by reference to the presentation date and amount and specific cause if nominated.
