Welcome from John Hickey, C.E.O. (Voluntary) of St. Vincent's Foundation

I am delighted to welcome readers to this, our 24th edition, of Friends of St Vincent's.

St. Vincent's Foundation has been in existence now for fifteen years. In that time we have received €11.5M in donations and fundraising proceeds from a myriad of sources. These have enabled the Foundation to support multiple projects involving medical research, advanced medical equipment and improvements to our patient environment. We regularly express our gratitude for all the thousands of individuals and organisations who have contributed. Our appreciation is very real and the positive impact is very evident.

In this edition we have outlined the financial performance in 2022 which is the most recent accounting period. We also encourage readers to visit our website to see all the detail of income and grant awards for this period and all other years.

We are pleased to have an article from Prof Michael Keane. Some of these projects and investments are very large and many, particularly research grants, can extend over many years. This will be a very significant investment and a phenomenal stride in the capacity of the hospital in medical training for patient benefits. The Lab is largely enabled by financial support from the McDermott family in memory of their much-loved Enda who, as a Consultant in St. Vincent's, was beloved of his colleagues and patients. He is sadly missed by all. This major project is a partnership with UCD which has also provided extremely generous support.



As I welcome all readers to this appreciation of our supporters, I would also recommend our website **www.stvincentsfoundation.ie** for more comprehensive and timely information of what is happening with St. Vincent's Foundation.

I want to thank all who make these outcomes possible; the donors, fundraisers, the staff in the SVHG hospitals, and the Directors and Members of St. Vincent's Foundation. Without their collective effort these results would not be possible.



2022 Business and Financial Summary

Income:


During 2022 St. Vincent's Foundation (SVF) received €897,010 in total income. The source of the funds is set out in the chart below. The biggest contributor was Donations followed by Bequests and Fundraising

proceeds.



Fundraising by a wide range of supporters and events continued to be very important as well as the very generous decision by many bereaved families to request donations to St. Vincent's in lieu of funeral flowers.

Reclaims of taxation on donations are included in the overall donation figure. €735,395 of funds received were restricted to specific causes with €161,615 unrestricted.



Grants:

During the year we made grant disbursements of €440,544.

- €216,687 of total grants was provided to purchase Equipment and Software for patient treatment and support.
- ♦ €178,707 was contributed to Medical Education and Research projects.
- ♦ €45,150 was spend on Patient Care.

Total grants in 2022 showed a small increase (9%) on 2021.

Principal Grant Allocations:

- Respiratory research in Sleep Laboratory €20,300
- Rheumatology Equipment €46,000
- Obesity Research €75,000 in partnership with Maynooth University
- Post Graduate education (UCD) €64,000

- Dietary equipment in St Michael's Hospital €12,000

Expenses:

St. Vincent's Foundation continues to operate on a voluntary basis with no salaries or wages. Costs were reduced by 24% to €19,975 (2021 €26,166). This is largely due to timing of payments and the figure for 2021 included a one-off payment for website improvement

Principal expenses are fees for accounting, legal and insurance, website hosting and maintenance, and production of our donor's magazine *Friends of St. Vincent's*. Travel costs, telephone costs, commission payments to iDonate for online donations, and financial charges make up the balance.

Early days of St. Vincent's

St. Vincent's Hospital was first opened its doors on February 3^{rd} 1834 at 56 St. Stephen's Green in a premises that cost £3,000 at that time. If we can paraphrase the ambition of the founder Mother Mary Aikenhead, 'For love we want to give care to the poor that the rich can obtain for money' In an unbroken series of nearly 190 years the hospital has delivered on that promise.

In the period it had a name change; from St. Vincent's Hospital to St. Vincent's University Hospital representing the partnership with UCD. It had a change of location in the late 1960's from St. Stephen's Green, where it had outgrown the original space and other surrounding buildings, to a brand new complex in Elm Park

Dublin 4. That campus has been massively enlarged over the years since, adding new services and emerging technologies that are central to a modern healthcare facility.

The other aspect that is incomparable to the founding years is the scale of patient numbers. As Prof Michael Keane has remarked elsewhere in this issue, St. Vincent's currently cares for more than 450,000 patients each year and the numbers continue to grow.

Looking back at the records from the early days demonstrates one feature that continues to this day. That is the contribution of generous donors to the development of care for patients. Mother Mary Aikenhead had confidence that she would receive sufficient financial support to establish the hospital and

make it viable. Amusingly we saw that a sailor who was treated in the hospital in the early years donated a parrot. As it transpired to have a rich vocabulary of foul language the parrot was subsequently auctioned to raise funds for the hospital.

Almost 2 centuries later we continue to see this generosity all the time and we invite readers to read about the modern donors and fundraisers of 2023.



We mention in each issue that, as a voluntary organisation, St. Vincent's Foundation assures donors and fundraisers, that every cent raised goes to the intended cause.

However you choose to help St. Vincent's, you are assured that all your donation goes to your selected cause without deduction of costs.

We are a voluntary organisation dedicated to raising funds for patient care, research and education in St. Vincent's.

A message from Prof. Michael Keane



I am delighted to contribute to this edition of *Friends of St. Vincent's* because I have seen, at first hand, the huge contribution that donors and fundraisers have made to our hospitals and our capacity to care for patients. This is an opportunity for me to express my thanks to each and every one of those kind people.

Each year St. Vincent's Healthcare Group treats more than 450,000 patients including 42,000 In-Patients, 161,000 Daycare patients, and 250,000 Outpatients. In addition we have 80,000 attendances in our Accident & Emergency Department. These numbers continue to grow and we are very aware that the capacity of our hospitals does not meet the ongoing needs of those we serve.

Our staff are vital to giving the best possible care to our patients. St Vincent's Healthcare Group has more than 6,000 employees consisting of 300 Consultants, 600 Non-Consultant Doctors, 3,000 Nurses, 1,500 Clinical Support Staff and 600 Administrative Support & management Staff. I want to pay a heartfelt thanks to all

staff within the Group for their unstinting efforts which I observe daily. I am aware that this magazine features unsolicited comments from patients and their families on the quality of treatment that our staff provide and this is very gratifying.

During the last year we recruited 38 new Consultant staff and we have a major focus on attracting and retaining doctors, nurses and support staff. As a teaching hospital we must invest in our education facilities and we are increasing our investment in these. The new Sim Lab is a huge contribution to this - referenced on page 23.

We had many achievements in our care capacity during the last year. These include the implementation of a Theatre Scheduling System and expansion of our ICU capacity. Our Obesity Management Care was developed and expanded providing greater accessibility to Bariatric surgical services. We increased capacity in St Anne's Day Centre and this enables more patients to receive treatments at home or closer to home. We also further developed our Robotic Surgery Service. This had initially been funded by the kind donations received through St. Vincent's Foundation. These are just a small sample of what has been happening and again I must pay tribute to the role that donors play in making these happen

In my role, as Group Clinical Director, I have a responsibility to ensure that we can deliver ongoing investment in world class clinical and translational research. In this, as in many other challenges, we are focussed on developing our links with other medical facilities locally and internationally. We will continue to invest in this work and these relationships. Our long-standing partnership with UCD is, of course, critical to our work in education and research and this continues to blossom.

For the future we will need to significantly increase our ability to cater for patient needs in many ways. We will be increasing our bed capacity (including Critical Care beds) in our three hospitals. We will develop new operating theatres and procedure rooms. We will also continue to enhance our diagnostic equipment. All of these, and the many other initiatives, will require investment. Donor and fundraising support will continue to be so important.

Thank you again for the opportunity to present this snapshot of St. Vincent's and for your welcome assistance to St. Vincent's Foundation.

Fundraising & Donor Highlights



In the following pages we detail many of the events that contribute to support for equipment and activities in our hospitals and to enable the many research projects that, over time, improve our capacity to care for patients and enhance their outcomes. Mostly, sources of support can be summarised as follows:

- **Personal Donations.** Usually done on a confidential basis where the donor wishes to make a difference but not be publicly identified. We always respect this and, if in doubt, do not name benefactors.
- **Fundraisers.** Ranging from personal participation in large events to uniquely organised functions, these are a major contributor to our funds. The creativity involved is amazing.
- ♦ Contributions from Pharmaceutical Companies. In support of specific research projects or healthcare initiatives, these companys' educational grants are very important in pursuing our aims of improving the medical environment for our patients.
- **Bequests.** Increasingly in recent years we have seen that people are setting down what they want to happen after their death and often including a gift to a preferred charity. In our case this frequently is for a specific cause in the hospital. St. Vincent's Foundation has been an active partner in MyLegacy.ie in encouraging people to make Wills and to consider a small donation to a charity of their choice. The central feature of this is "Best Will Week" which happens each Autumn.
- ♦ **Donations in lieu of funeral flowers.** These continue to be a most generous source of support. The generosity is all the more remarkable given the sadness affecting the bereaved families at the time. We always advise families of each donation when they are requested in lieu of flowers.
- Wedding favours. On a much happier note, we are always delighted when couples decide to include a gift to St. Vincent's, as part of their wedding plans, instead of Wedding Favours on their great day.
- ◆ Tax Refunds. In some circumstances personal donations can allow us to make a claim from the Revenue for a tax rebate which increases the value of the donation at no further cost to the donor. We encourage donors to sign the necessary certificates where appropriate.
- ◆ Collection Boxes. Each year these boxes throughout the hospital raise nearly €10,000 which is a very welcome addition. We must thank those people who, completely anonymously, support our collection boxes so generously throughout the hospital.
- Standing Orders. We take the opportunity to thank the people who, over time, have created Standing Orders for regular payments to St. Vincent's Foundation. Many of these have been running for several years and we really appreciate each and every one.

A big, big thank you to all involved and we hope you will enjoy and be inspired by the stories that follow.

Collen Construction fundraising for St. Anne's Cancer Care:

We are reporting on two Collen annual fundraising Charity Cycles, because of the timing of the event and presentation of donations. This amazing company now in it's 213th year of doing business, places the highest priority on contributing to the communities in which it operates. St. Vincent's is fortunate to have been selected as a Charity Partner by Collen raising funds for St Anne's Cancer in the hospital. St. Anne's was originally selected by Collen in memory of their much-loved colleague, the late Conor O'Carroll R.I.P., who was treated in St. Vincent's.

We cannot better describe the **2022** event than to reproduce the words of Tommy Drumm, Managing Director of Collen Construction. "Collen Construction held their annual Charity Cycle over the weekend of Friday 23^{rd} – Sunday 25^{th} September 2022. A total of 140 participants made up of Collen employees, friends, family, charity partners, clients, subcontractors, and extended supply chain participated in the event, choosing their own route and



cycling at their own pace. The event also had 30 main sponsors from Collen's supply chain and brought together Collen's project teams in Ireland, Germany and Sweden, with others participating in Abu Dhabi, UK, France, Hong Kong, Spain, South Africa and USA. A total of over 10,000km was cycled, with €80,000 raised for Collen's 17 charity partners, which includes €5,000 to St. Vincent's Foundation." The 2022 Charity presentation where Neil Collen, Chairman and Tommy Drumm, M.D. presented John Hickey, C.E.O., SVF with a cheque for €5,000

The **2023 Charity Cycle** which was named "Building Bridges" took place in September. The title adopted reflects the message of connection and unity as a bridge of support. The concept was that as many people as possible would take part and either cross or pass a bridge as part of their cycle. Sandra Kelly, the extraordinary Chair of the Cycling Committee highlighted the driving motivation of the fundraising: "Whether bridging physical distance, or overcoming obstacles, anything is possible when we commit to 'Building Bridges' together".

Predictably the 2023 event was a huge success. 480 team members took part raising a grand total of €150,000 for 21 charities in Ireland, UK, Sweden and Denmark. St. Vincent's Foundation was presented with a fantastic donation of €9,000 from the 2023 event, bringing to €28,000 the support that the Collen Cycle has contributed to Cancer Care in the hospital since 2020. As regular readers will be aware all donations are recorded as anonymous unless directed otherwise by the donor. 


Charity Cycle in July:

Fundraiser in memory of John Grant (Sconny) R.I.P.

We feel it is very appropriate to reproduce the message of the family as they sought donations to the fund: "John Grant was a great family man, who passed away at only 50 years old from Pancreatic Cancer, after only being diagnosed 8 days prior. He is painfully missed by his wife Katherine, his young children - Dean, Valerie, Callum & Kaylah, his siblings Caroline, Micky & Paul and all his extended family. John was one of life's good guys - he was kind, considerate, respectful, selfless, loving to Katherine and his kids, hardworking and great craic. Pancreatic Cancer is often called the silent

killer, and with good reason, most people don't experience symptoms until the cancer is big enough to impact the surrounding organs, and the symptoms are often vague. Every cent raised is going to St. Vincent's Foundation for Research into the Early Detection of Pancreatic Cancer."

Our legion of fundraisers and donors all have one thing in common—they want to improve the environment and outcomes for current and future patients. In some cases the donors have already identified, perhaps from conversations with care staff, how they would like to do something that makes things better. In many other, they know the area of medicine or of St. Vincent's that they want to benefit from their efforts. In all of these circumstances we are always delighted to demonstrate how these funds really do make a difference. In doing so we must give a huge Thank You to the people who made these happen.

Condolence Cards:

St. Vincent's Foundation were delighted to provide a grant of €750 to the Social Work Bereavement Care team for the production of new condolence cards to provide to families after the death of a loved one in the hospital.

ENT improvements thanks to a €100,000 donation:

The generosity of an anonymous donation of €100,000 made in January this year, has enabled a hugely positive investment that would not have happened otherwise. In our Ear Nose & Throat (ENT) Department a key investigative procedure requires a reusable naso-pharyngeal scope.

(pictured on the left is the Wassenburg Automated Endoscope Reprocessor (AER)

After each use this equipment needs to be fully decontaminated. Currently this is done in a three-stage process as it has been historically. As technology has evolved in this area, this has become the least preferred option, internationally, to do the cleaning.

This most generous donation has enabled us to commission a fully automated system to replace this process at a total cost of €96,579. As well as the process efficiencies which will enable us to deal with many more ENT patients in the same time period, the process is total traceable and validated. (pictured the Scopes in Drying cabinet)

It is a wonderful addition to our capacity for care in ENT and doubly important because the number of ENT patients presenting is growing all the time for a variety of reasons.

Sincere thanks on behalf of our patients to the anonymous donor.

T.V.'s for Caritas step-down facility:

St. Vincent's Foundation was pleased to provide a grant of €7,233 for the provision of 26 TV's in the premises previously occupied by Caritas but now used as a "step-down" facility for SVUH. Caritas currently caters for 31 patients who no longer need the intensive nursing/medical care that SVUH provides but are not ready for discharge. It serves well in alleviating pressure on the hospital beds. SVF has invested heavily in the TV population throughout SVUH ensuring that every ward area is appropriately provided with working TVs. It has had a very positive effect and it seems wrong that step-down patients would be any less well served.



SVF grant for Medical English classes for Ukrainian doctors in Ireland:

St. Vincent's University Hospital was pleased to announce in May last, the successful graduation of 25 Ukrainian doctors from a comprehensive English language course. The course was initiated and developed by SVUH consultants Dr. John Holian and Prof Hugh Mulcahy (pictured) and supported by the

hospital management.

The course was delivered by Ukrainian lecturer Prof Oksana Kachurets in response to the significant language barrier faced by Ukrainian doctors arriving in Ireland.

St. Vincent's Foundation was delighted to support this great initiative with a grant of €2,280.



Dietary Machine for C.F. Unit:

Due to a most generous donation of €9,000 from the McNamara Family in Waterford in July 2023, a Bio-electrical Impedence Analysis (BIA) machine (pictured) was purchased for the C.F. Unit.

Clodagh Landers, a Dietitian with the C.F. Unit outlines "The staff and patients in the CF Unit would like to extend their sincere thanks to the McNamara family for their extremely generous donation to fund the purchase of a BIA machine. This will facilitate in-depth analysis of body composition of people with CF to improve our clinical practice in line with international guidelines. It will also support future collaborative research projects with other CF centres across Ireland."

Recliner Chairs for C.F. Unit:

The McNamara Family also generously donated €11,980 during the summer for the purchase of recliner chairs for St. Christopher's C.F. Unit.

From the Philip Dunne "Sunflower" project we were able to complete the replacement and upgrading of the recliner chairs in St. Christopher's. This is important for patients and their families using these facilities.

New Next Generation Sequencing Service at St. Vincent's University Hospital:

Enabled by a grant from St. Vincent's Foundation and other kind philanthropic contributors, St. Vincent's recently invested in a state of the art technology that will have a major positive impact on the care for our patients. We are grateful to Dr. Maura Cotter for summarising this service:

"We are very pleased to announce our in-house solid tumour next generation sequencing (NGS) service is up and running in St. Vincent's University Hospital since August 2023. Our molecular laboratory now houses a vital piece of new equipment which allows for the simultaneous detection of multiple genes from the one patient tumour sample. The generous donation from St. Vincent's Foundation significantly contributed to the purchase of this NGS instrument, the first NGS platform to be set up within the hospital.

The treatment options for cancer patients have grown significantly over the past few years with the development of molecular targeted therapies. The Oncomine Focus Assay allows us to understand the mutational profile of tumour samples and more precisely guide personalised treatment decisions against the specific molecular alterations identified. We now routinely report tumour-specific gene panels for pancreatic, bile duct, colonic, bladder, melanoma and breast cancers among others. Having the equipment in-house enables us to give a detailed report to our oncologists and patients as soon as possible rather than outsourcing requests.

This is an exciting time for our department and for our molecular team who have worked tirelessly to get us to this point. Our vision is to further develop our molecular service by expanding our cancer panels and cancer testing down the line. Providing our clinicians with the molecular information they need accurately and quickly so they can take care of our SVUH patients is truly essential."

Through high quality simulation-based education, healthcare professionals can learn together, practice and rehearse in a controlled and risk-free setting. This not only benefits our hospital and our patients but it will also strengthen the broader medical community.

The key objective of the Liver Transplant Patient Day, in addition to celebrating the 30th Anniversary of the inauguration of the National Liver Transplant programme, was to assist current and future patients to achieve better outcomes. The Patient Day was held in UCD on Saturday 14th October 2023. The day was a huge success and we are grateful to Dr. Audrey Dillon, Consultant Hepatologist for summarising the event for us:

"The National Liver transplant programme celebrated 30 years and 1300 liver transplants in SVUH with a patient education day in the O'Reilly Hall UCD attended by 500 recipients, their families and both current and past members of staff.



Mr. Justin Geoghegan, who recently retired from the programme opened the day, followed by a series of talks on the history of the unit presented by Prof. Oscar Traynor, surgeon who founded the programme and Prof. Aiden McCormick, Hepatologist; healthy diet, activity and skincare after transplant presented by Ms. Niamh O'Sullivan, Clinical Specialist Dietician, Ms. Laura Talty, Senior Physiotherapist and Ms. Louise Fleming, Skin Cancer CNS and on the future aspirations of the programme presented by Dr. Audrey Dillon, Hepatologist and Mr Emir Hoti, Transplant Surgeon. The highlights of the day for

Familial Lung Fibrosis Research project:

"All this money was raised by the efforts of David Crosby and all donors contributed on the basis that the money was for Lung Fibrosis research. David achieved this, running himself in three marathons. David went on a thorough search for a research recipient, that would deliver research output and scientific return on investment. He and his team have identified Killian Hurley's gene focused research work as the optimum recipient and I fully support this money being activated and used".

National Simultaneous Pancreas & Kidney Study Day:

In October, St. Vincent's Foundation was pleased to financially support this highly important event. We should stress that this would not have been possible without the funds provided to the Foundation from fundraising events and donations. We think that donors will be proud to see how this medical area of key focus in St. Vincent's will be enabled to improve outcomes for patients as a consequence of this and similar activities in the future.

We are delighted that Caroline Doyle, Transplant Coordinator in S.V.U.H. has summarised the content, atmosphere and outcomes from the day. Caroline's report is reproduced below:

"On the 13th October 2023 we had our National Simultaneous Pancreas & Kidney Study Day. SVF grant for new T-Pro Digital Dictation System:

T-Pro is designed to speed up communications with patients, ensuring earlier confirmation of appointments and meetings with healthcare providers.

T-Pro is being introduced to the Hospital on a phased basis. With the full implementation, we can optimise our clinical workflows and provide a higher standard of care to our patients.

Chemo Compounding Robot in St. Vincent's Private Hospital:

Enabled by money donated specifically for the benefit of St. Vincent's Private Hospital (SVPH), St. Vincent's Foundation recently made a grant of €100,000 to purchase a Chemo Compounding Robot in S.V.P.H. Hospital Management describe the benefits of this investment:

"S.V.P.H. is extremely grateful for the Foundation's support which has facilitated SVPH being the first Private hospital in Ireland to order an Aseptic (Chemo) Compounding Robot,. S.V.P.H. has the busiest private Oncology service in Ireland. The Aseptic Compounding Unit team consists of 19 dedicated Technicians and Pharmacists who currently work in a challenging work environment using manual isolators to compound the chemo.

Hazardous drugs including chemotherapy must be made in controlled clean room conditions to protect the staff from the product and the product from the environment. This Compounding Robot presents an excellent opportunity to increase staff safety while increasing product output to maximise patient treatments."

Brian Fitzgerald, C.E.O. of S.V.P.H. said: "The most important element of the care we provide to our patients is the quality of staff we employ and we are committed to providing our staff with an excellent working environment. Our investment in an Aseptic (Chemo) Compounding Robot will help minimise work related strain injuries while also increasing our capacity to care for a greater number of Oncology patients".

Donors:

Personal details of **Donors** will remain confidential unless SVF is specifically requested by the Donor to publicise them. Otherwise Donors will be able to recognise their own donation by reference on that page to the donation date and amount and by the cause, if they have specified one.

In respect of personal donations of €250 or more, there is an opportunity to make a claim to the Revenue for a repayment of tax paid. This further increases the value of the donation without any additional cost to the donor. In relevant situations we ask donors to sign a CHY form to enable the claim.
